Voice Talent Biographies

Rob Paulsen **(Coconut Fred)**

"I'm getting paid to do what I got in trouble for in the 7th grade," jests Rob Paulsen, one of the most popular voices in animation, who won an Emmy Award for "Outstanding Performer in an Animated Program" for Warner Bros. Animation's series "Steven Spielberg Presents Pinky & The Brain." In addition, Paulsen has won multiple Annie Awards. Voicing numerous characters in Warner Bros. Animation's "Taz-Mania" and "Steven Spielberg Presents Tiny Toon Adventures," Paulsen is best known as the voice of the boisterous and energetic laboratory mouse Pinky on the two hit series "Steven Spielberg Presents Pinky & The Brain" and "Steven Spielberg Presents Pinky, Elmyra & The Brain."

With over 2,000 half-hours of animation to his credit, the versatile Paulsen shines in his starring role as the voice of Yakko on the Peabody and two-time Emmy Award-winning series "Steven Spielberg Presents Animaniacs." He can be heard in "Danny Phantom," "The Three Musketeers," "Mulan II," "The Fox and the Hound," "Jimmy Neutron: Boy Genius," "Lilo & Stitch" and as various characters in "The Fairly OddParents."

Eric Bauza **(Slip D'Peel & Slide D'Peel)**

Eric Bauza has been a longtime fan of cartoons ever since he was a child. This Toronto, Canada, native has been drawing cartoons from the time he could pick up a pencil and has had a passion for imitating character voices after spending countless hours watching his favorite cartoon shows.

Throughout his college years, Bauza studied radio, television and film and worked behind-the-scenes on live-action productions, in addition to his voice-over work.

While Bauza considers Warner Bros. Animation's "Coconut Fred's Fruit Salad Island" his first big project, he has also lent his lungs to such shows as "The Ripping Friends" as well as "Ren & Stimpy: Adult Party Cartoon." Bauza can also be heard in commercials for Sony Playstation's video game "Ape Escape."

Michael Donovan **(Mr. Greenrind)**

Michael Donovan has been in the "voice" business for more than 32 years. Donovan began his career as a radio announcer and worked at several stations in North America. Out of boredom, he started doing voices on the air. His radio work helped to score an audition for an NBC animated series "Captain N: The Gamemaster" in 1989. Donovan landed the role and hasn't turned back. Since then, he has voiced more than 300 animated episodes and video games and thousands of commercials.

In addition to playing the lovable, but constantly upset Mr. Greenrind, he can also be

heard as El Rey and countless other characters on Warner Bros. Animation's "¡Mucha Lucha!," as well as Spike from Warner Bros. Animation's "Tom and Jerry Tales" series.

While Donovan loves performing, he spends most of his time directing other actors as an animation voice director, where he has worked on over 1,000 animated episodes.

Brian Drummond (Lemon Wedge)

Brian Drummond knew his voice would be a big part of his life. Whether it would be in a good way or a bad way he wasn't sure. In elementary school, Brian was assigned to write "I will not talk in class" lines so often, he decided to write them by the hundreds in advance and keep them in his desk until his next assignment. In lieu of giving up his talking in class, he found it easier to do the lines.

Drummond still can't keep quiet. However, instead of writing lines, he spends most of his time giving voice to them, as he now voices a number of television's most popular animated characters. He can be heard on many traditional and CG animated series, including Warner Bros. Animation's series "Krypto the Superdog," "Baby Looney Tunes" and "¡Mucha Lucha!," as well as "Inspector Gadget & the Gadgetinis," "Beast Machines: Transformers," "He-Man and the Masters of the Universe," "Spider-Man Unlimited," "Inuyasha" and "Dragon Ball Z," among others.

Drummond has also been seen in numerous TV series, including "Smallville," "The X-Files," "Stargate SG-1," "Tru Calling," "Dark Angel," "Taken," "Traffic," and "The Dead Zone." He has also appeared in such feature films as "3000 Miles to Graceland," "Ballistic: Ecks vs. Sever" and "Edison."

Britt McKillip (Bingo Cherry)

At the age of 14, Britt McKillip is already a seasoned young veteran of stage, film and animation. As one-half of the award-winning country/pop duo Saving Grace, McKillip has wowed audiences with her stunning vocals at venues such as the Merritt Mountain Music festival, opening for Keith Urban in front of 65,000 people.

McKillip's list of film and television credits includes "Mission to Mars," "In the Doghouse" (for which she was nominated for a 1999 Young Artist Award), "Due East," "My Brother's Keeper," "Wes Craven Presents Don't Look Down," as well as episodes of "The Outer Limits" and "Honey, I Shrunk The Kids: The TV Show." Her most recognized role, however, was playing the oddball Reggie for two seasons of the critically acclaimed Showtime series "Dead Like Me."

Even as a little girl, McKillip had an uncanny ability to mimic and entertain. It comes as no surprise, then, that over the past few years, she has lent her voice to many characters in such series as Warner Bros. Animation's "Baby Looney Tunes" and "Firehouse Tales," among others.

David Kaye (Bunga Berry)

One of the most prolific voice actors in North America, David Kaye was already a radio professional by the age of 16. Working summers and weekends during his high school years in Peterborough, Ontario, Canada, he decided to forego his plans for a psychology degree to pursue a full-time career on-air, which turned out to be the best decision of his life.

After establishing himself as a top radio personality, Kaye landed his first professional voice-over jobs in "G.I. Joe" and "G.I. Joe Extreme." Kaye immediately garnered further notice when he began voicing the infamous Megatron on "Beast Wars: Transformers."

Since then, he has voiced over a hundred characters in myriad series, including Warner Bros. Animation's "Tom and Jerry Tales," "X-Men: Evolution," "Inuyasha," "Mickey's Twice Upon A Christmas" and the upcoming theatrical release "Ant Bully," among others.
